1. Benefits and Education:

Describe the objectives of your project and how it will benefit OHV recreation and education. (25 points)

This grant will fund an OHV Trail Crew for six months in 2006 and the Rocky Mountain Youth Corps (RMYC) for 2 weeks. The crew will maintain existing and designated trails, design and build new trails and trailhead parking areas, update trails inventory, monitor trails for safety concerns or resource impacts and provide information to OHV users on riding areas, trail conditions and regulations. They will also plan and participate in larger projects with the RMYC. It is estimated that the crew and the RMYC will complete at least 10 miles of new trail construction, 50 miles of trail maintenance and 10 miles of trail reconstruction. The OHV Trail Crew will work 10 hour days, Friday through Monday so that they are working during the high use times during the weekends. They will ride Suzuki 400 motorcycles equipped with trail maintenance tools. These bikes were purchased by the BLM in 2002 and 2003 and modeled after the Statewide OHV Trail crew motorcycles. The crew will also use Trimble Geo3 (or newer) GPS units to map trails and identify areas of concern. The RMYC will work for two weeks with the OHV Trail Crew on larger projects. All work will be done on routes open to motorized use.

The crew will focus in two types of areas, those limited to designated routes, including Special Recreation Management Areas (SRMAs), and Open Areas. Within the SRMAs crews will assess the trail system early in the riding season, and perform any needed maintenance to trails and signs. These areas will be checked on a regular basis through the season and trails will be maintained as needed. Any new trails will be designed and submitted for approval, with the intent of doing the construction in the following field season.

In Open areas, the crew will focus on keeping the route inventory up to date, signing public land boundaries, identifying any safety hazards and informing visitors of any restrictions or concerns.

OHV riding opportunities will be created and improved by the ongoing maintenance and monitoring of our designated trail systems and by the monitoring and inventory of Open Areas. By having a regular presence in the field during the riding season, the crew will be able to readily identify problems with the trail systems and quickly remedy them.

The crew will be providing essential maintenance that will keep OHV riding opportunities available. Without maintenance in some areas the trails become impossible to ride. A portion of a loop that is not rideable prevents use of the whole loop, so keeping the system maintained is very important.

Education will be one of the responsibilities of the Trail Crew. They will distribute maps of riding areas, post TREAD LIGHTLY! information at trailheads and in local bike

shops, and speak with visitors about responsible riding. The Off-Highway Vehicle Registration Fund will be promoted though these efforts as well.

The OHV enthusiasts who will benefit include motorcyclists, ATV riders, and 4WD users. The number of users increases every year as the population of the area grows along with the popularity of the sport. As the OHV community learns about the improved riding opportunities even more use will occur.

Multiple uses of trail will be managed based on the width of the trail. Single track trails less than 36" wide will be open to non-motorized uses and motorcycles. Trails less than 52" wide will be open to non-motorized uses, motorcycles and ATVs. Trails and roads greater than 52" wide will be open to non-motorized uses and all motorized uses.

This project will provide economic and quality of life benefits to local communities by increasing trail-related visitation to these areas and providing local residents a riding area close to home.

2. Partnerships:

Provide evidence of support for this project from trail users, agencies, local governments, community groups, or individuals (letters, petitions, news articles, event descriptions, etc. must be attached to your application packet). (25 points)

This project has a variety of support, including OHV enthusiasts, clubs and businesses, local conservation organizations and local governments. The GSFO is committed to working with several partners on all travel management activities. We have been working closely with the Eagle Valley Sport Riders for several years on improving OHV opportunities in the area. We have also been working with the Town of Eagle, Town of Gypsum, Eagle County and Rifle Recreation Department on travel management issues and have formed very good working relationships with these local governments. The trail crew is supported by OHV enthusiasts because they improves trails, enhance riding opportunities and provide information on riding areas and regulations. Conservation organizations and local governments also support the trail crew because they provide for re-routing trails around sensitive areas, improve the information available to visitors and decrease erosion by improving trail drainage, grade and surfacing. 3. Leverage:

List the amounts and sources of funds, in-kind services, materials, and trail acquisition costs for this project that will be used to leverage OHV Registration Grants. (25 points)

Regional and local volunteers will be used to plan and construct new trails and to maintain existing trails. The OHV trail crew would lead volunteer projects on trails where improvements to drainage, grade or surface is needed. Projects would also include re-routing trails away from hazardous or sensitive areas.

Cash Match: If this grant is awarded, the BLM is eligible for Challenge Cost Share (CCS) funds which will match 1:1 the funds received from the OHV Registration Grant. CCS funds have been received by the GSFO for the past three years, and are expected to continue as long as we have grants to match. If received, the CCS funds will pay for motorcycle maintenance, directional and informational signs and maps, and project supplies and materials.

In-kind Match: services and materials including use of BLM vehicles, motorcycles, tools and equipment as well as BLM staff time to supervise and coordinate the program. The GSFO has two Suzuki 400 motorcycles equipped with trail building tools like those used by the Statewide OHV Trail Crew. The Town of Eagle, Town of Gypsum and Eagle County have been involved in trail planning for the past few years. They are willing to help when needed with in-kind donations of labor and equipment.

In 2004 the BLM funded a full time two person trail crew in the GSFO. The crew worked 40 hours per week on trail related projects. During this year they assessed 200 miles of trail, contacted 100 people, built and maintained 65 trail structures, installed 45 signs and inventoried an additional 10 miles of routes. They also designed new trail routes that will be approved and constructed in 2005. In 2005 the crew will work on the planning and design of new routes that will be constructed in 2006. As we build on the success of each year, our goal is to create one of the most effective OHV management programs in the state.






This project aids in the protection and improvement of the environment by identifying areas where trails have impacted resources and mitigating those impacts by improving or re-routing the trail. Any new trails will be constructed in a manner which prevents soil erosion and avoids sensitive wildlife, cultural or riparian areas and croded areas will be re-vegetated. The public will continue to be educated about these resources through direct contact with the OHV crew, interpretive signs, maps and brochures. Ongoing monitoring will take place which will aid in the assessment of impacts to the areas.


The project meets the land management objectives written in the Castle Peak Travel Management Plan to provide a variety of motorized recreational opportunities in the Bocco Mountain and Gypsum Hills Special Recreation Management Areas. The work done by the OHV trail crew and the Rocky Mountain Youth Corps will help us to meet those objectives. Once the Roan Plateau Land Use Plan is complete, this project will implement the Travel Management decisions from that document. It will improve the long term sustainability of the trail system by providing ongoing maintenance and monitoring which will prevent the loss of trail opportunities.


The Town of Eagle held several public hearings on the issue of travel management in their open space areas during the summer of 2004. In addition, the BLM conducted a Travel Assessment of the adjacent Hardscrabble area to identify the travel related issues in that area. As a result, of these two related efforts, the Town has designated motorized access through their Open Space lands. This allows legal public motorized access to BLM lands from the Town of Eagle. The BLM is working on an system of designated routes within the area that will be implemented and monitored by the OHV crew.



The Town of Eagle would like to offer this letter in support of the Glenwood Springs BLM (c/o of Dorothy Morgan) application for an OHV Grant. The grant request would enable the BLM to fund two Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) Trail Crew members for the 2006 summer season. The OHV Trail Crew is responsible for motorized route monitoring, signing, construction, maintenance, mapping and education.

The Town of Eagle recently undertook a six month travel management plan for its approximately 1,000 acres of native open space lands that lie adjacent to BLM lands. This letter is in support of the Glenwood Springs Field Office (GSFO) OHV Grant Application. RMYC hires crews of young adults (ages 16-25) to undertake priority conservation projects such as watershed restoration, trail building and maintenance, fire/fuels reduction work, invasive weed eradication, bridges, fencing, and campground and park maintenance. RMYC is an accredited youth corps of the Colorado Youth Corps Association.

All projects are designed to provide specific environmental education while teaching work skills including teamwork, leadership, self-reliance, technical conservation skills and personal responsibility. RMYC provides work crews to land managers on a weekly basis throughout the summer and fall conservation season. Crews work on public lands (including private lands with public easements).

RMYC consistently strives for projects and sponsor relationships that have a long-term impact, provide educational potential, and/or be high priority—The GSFO / OHV proposal encompasses all of these goals. Also, the GSFO candidacy for the OHV Good Management Program suggests that the long-term prospects of these localized OHV areas would be very positive, all the while providing a great connection for quality RMYC project and partnering opportunities in the future.

it would be essential for a full time person to monitor the transportation system, enforcing regulations and educating the users. The RMYC would provide 10 crewmembers to work with the BLM 2 person crew. They would maintain trails and help with construction projects that need additional help or people to accomplish the job.

This will be the third consecutive OHC grant application for the OHV Trail Crew. After completion of the third funded project BLM will be eligible for the "Good Management Program" which will automatically fund the crew each year. BLM will match the grant with Challenge Cost Share funds and ECO trails will provide additional in-kind match in project coordination and trail design.

In summary the proposed plan would provide a very positive effect in the areas described. We encourage you to fully fund this project including the use of the Rocky Mountain Youth Corp.
